knowledge and research in the field in question this book is organized into four parts  
encompassing 12 chapters and begins with an overview of the study of urbanization and  
urban sociology the opening part describes the nature of industrial urbanism in great  
britain this part deals with the development of british urban sociology and the idea of  
neighborhood community the next part examines the distinction between ways of life in  
the modern city and the modern suburb this part also looks into the context of

urbanization involving population dispersal and diffusion the closing parts provide an analysis of the urban system in terms of a conflict model and demonstrate the development of prague s ecological structure these parts also discuss the notion of a rural urban continuum and the process of adjustment to an urban system in africa this book will prove useful to sociologists and researchers

classic and contemporary readings in sociology introduces the reader to sociological issues theories and debates providing extracts of primary source material from both classical and contemporary theorists theorists are examined within their historical and sociological framework and the text provides an analysis of developments in sociological thought and research the text is divided into four main sections part one origins and concepts surveys the history of the discipline of sociology and examines key themes which have influenced sociological theorising and investigation in particular social control culture and socialisation parts two and four sociological theories and sociological research include a number of readings from the founding theorists and investigators including auguste comte emile durkheim karl marx max weber and charles booth and also include more recent theoretical writing and research approaches the focus on theory and research is extended by a selection of readings centred around the theme of differences and inequalities part three these readings provide students with examples of work from an area where sociological theorising and research has been widely applied

whilst particularly useful as a companion to the sixth edition of giddens s sociology the reader is designed for use independently or alongside other textbooks

excerpt from readings in descriptive and historical sociology edited by franklin h giddings the chief purpose held in view in preparing this volume has been to offer to the beginner in sociological studies significant examples of the great facts of social evolution and of their interpretation and to present them so that collectively and in connection with a mere outline of theory they should constitute a fairly complete scheme of elementary readings in descriptive and historical sociology they should not be accepted by the teacher as a substitute for inductive research on the part of the student my own method of using such materials in teaching has been to require students to find analyze and classify similar materials obtained from historical sources statistical and other official reports newspapers and current literature the selections here given thus become samples and points of comparison and the mind of the student is kept alert to discover essential similarities between facts drawn from widely different sources among the selections will be found many readings that every student of this subject should be familiar with but which often are inaccessible to classes distant from large libraries many other selections have purposely been taken from a class of materials that in the narrower sense of the word are unhistorical while in a broader sense they have an historical character of the utmost importance about the publisher forgotten books publishes hundreds of thousands of rare and classic books find more at forgottenbooks.com this book is a reproduction of an important historical work forgotten books uses state of the art technology to digitally reconstruct the work preserving the original format whilst repairing imperfections present in the aged copy in rare cases an imperfection in the original such as a blemish or missing page may be replicated in our edition we do however repair the vast majority of imperfections successfully any imperfections that remain are intentionally left to preserve the state of such historical works

become preoccupied with the analysis of the texts of their respective disciplines it is recognized that social scientists construct and interpret representations of the social world moreover there is widespread recognition that the characteristics of each discipline are in part describable in terms of the distinctive conventions of a given genre consequently the intellectual work of being a social scientist is in large measure predicated on conventions of reading and writing this volume brings together a collection of important essays in the general area of sociological texts and the conventional practices of reading and writing
